Notes to Ontario Film and Television Production Statistics for 2008

- Ontario's film and television industry contributed \$671.2 million to the
 provincial economy in 2008. The figure was down 15.1% from last year
 (\$791.0 million), with the drop attributed to ongoing labour interruptions,
 increased competition from other jurisdictions, the continuing strength of the
 Canadian dollar in the first six months of the year and the upheaval in global
 financial markets at the end of the year.
- The Writers Guild of America strike began in November 2007 and lasted until
 the third week of February 2008, followed by a lag of several months while
 production ramped back up. The WGA strike mostly affected foreign
 television production for TV movies, mini-series, specials and pilots which
 were down \$19.9 million or 38.6%.

- Domestic television production was strong, with TV series increasing by \$127.5 million or 39.1%, as high profile television series, such as *Flashpoint* and *The Listener* were picked up by U.S. networks. Domestic feature film production was down \$49.1 million or 64.9% compared to 2007, which was an unusually high year that included two large budget films.
- The high Canadian dollar, combined with the ongoing Screen Actors Guild contract dispute, increased competition from film jurisdictions like New York, (deleted unavailability) shortage of available large stage spaces of large studio space (FILMPORT did not open until July 2008) and the worldwide financial crisis, severely impacted foreign service feature productions, which fell 64.9% to \$79 million.
- The outlook for the industry is much more optimistic for 2009. There is already strong interest being shown in filming in Ontario and foreign service productions Scott Pilgrim vs The World, SAW VI and Warehouse 13 are in pre-production along with several new US network pilots. On the domestic side, Chloe and a number of new one-hour TV series are currently in pre-production. Upcoming OMDC Film Fund-supported features include Highrise and The Love Child of Andy Warhol and Yoko Ono, while just completed titles include Suck and Defendor. OMDC's Film Fund supported a total of seven of the 15 domestic feature films made in Ontario in 2008.
