#### 2011 PRODUCTION ACTIVITY NOTES

- Ontario's domestic production continued a five-year growth pattern contributing \$852.1 million compared to \$646.2 million in 2010 a 32% increase.
- Domestic television series grew 34% to \$626.7 million from \$467.9 million in 2010, with the number of productions increasing to 135 from 104. This reflected the continuing success of domestic producers partnering with US and international broadcasters, including: E1 Entertainment's and Thump Inc.'s Rookie Blue (running on Global-TV and picked up by ABC), Global Television's and E1 Entertainment's The Firm (picked up by NBC) and Epitome Pictures' The L.A. Complex (running on MuchMusic and picked up by The CW Network).
- Budgets for domestic television movies of the week, mini-series and pilots were down, reflecting the ongoing trend towards unscripted reality-show productions.
- Domestic feature film production spiked in 2011 contributing \$165.9 million in 2011 compared to \$62.6 million in 2010 a 165% increase. This was due to a number of large treaty co-productions such as Impact Pictures' **Resident Evil: Retribution**, Film Farm's **Foxfire**, David Cronenberg's **Cosmopolis** and Davis Films' and Don Carmody Productions' **Silent Hill: Revelation 3D**.
- Foreign feature film production was \$231.6 million compared to \$159.3 million in 2010 a 45% increase reflecting the continuing influence of the Ontario Government's 2009 enhancements to the <u>Ontario Production Services Tax Credit</u>, which was expanded from 25% of eligible labour to include all eligible Ontario production costs. While the number of foreign feature films dropped slightly, budgets were larger, including two of the largest feature films ever shot in the province: Sony Pictures remake of **Total Recall** and Legendary Pictures' **Pacific Rim** (a film by Director Guillermo del Toro).
- Foreign television series spending continued to grow contributing \$150.2 million in 2011 compared to \$119 million in 2010 -- a 26% increase. Included were the Warner Bros. series Nikita and five shows from Universal Cable/NBC-Universal Television:
   Warehouse-13, Suits, Covert Affairs, Against The Wall and Alphas.

- Ontario's world-class facilities and competitive tax credits also attracted a number of
  productions shot outside the province to do their post-production, animation and visual
  effects here, including TV series The Borgias and Camelot, and the feature film The
  Three Musketeers. The Ontario Computer Animation and Special Effects Tax Credit
  again helped Ontario's computer animation and visual effects companies show a strong
  performance during the year.
- OMDC's Film Commission is already scouting a number of projects for 2012 including network pilots and feature film projects, and the outlook for 2012 is excellent with 24 productions shooting or in prep as of January 20 – the largest number in some years for this early in the year.

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
